

# Tackling health inequality and eliminating debilitating diseases

Everyone has the right to access quality, affordable health care, where and when they need it. But for half the world's population, it's out of reach. Vision, the most dominant of our senses, is vital at every turn of our lives, yet globally, the number of people in need of eye care is spiralling. 90% of people affected by eye diseases live in low- and middle- income countries. Unless eye health services improve, an estimated 61 million people could be blind by 2050.

## Eyes on impact

Alice's story shows how one person's sight-saving treatment can ripple throughout an entire community.

In Malawi, life in Alice's community is not easy, and there are many hurdles she faces, not least the impact of climate change. In recent months, flooding has caused death and devastation throughout the region. She lost her house and possessions, and barely escaped with her life. But by tackling treatable eye conditions such as cataracts, it means there's one less challenge causing hardship for people like Alice.

A mobile health worker visiting the community advised Alice to visit a doctor, to see if her sight could be improved. And this is how Alice came to meet Rex Bwanausi (pictured here), who travels the Chikwawa region, where Alice lives, to help people access eye care.

Alice tells us: "I heard about the eye specialists from my friends, I used to have difficulties seeing whenever night fell, I was failing to do anything on my own. I would sit in one place waiting for someone to cook and do everything for me." Her son, Lino, was able to take her to Chikwawa hospital, and she was diagnosed with cataracts and referred for surgery.

### Restoring independence

Alice had two successful operations on her eyes. "The first thing I saw after the operation was the light," she says. "I told my son that I am now able to see clearly! My life has changed a lot. I can fetch water, cook, and even walk to the market."

Alice has now become a passionate advocate for eye health encouraging everyone with eye issues to seek help. The impact on her community has been immeasurable – it goes beyond restoring sight. It has enabled adults like Alice to regain their independence, ensured children no longer miss school, and the community now dispels fears and false rumours about eye surgery.

NTDs are a set of 20 infectious diseases. They affect more than 1 billion people in the poorest communities in the world and can cost economies billions every year. Our aim is to consign five of these blinding and debilitating diseases to the history books.

NTDs are most prevalent in rural regions, poor urban areas, and conflict zones. These conditions can cause excruciating pain, reduce people's social and economic chances and, in some cases, even be fatal. Yet, they can be prevented, treated and in many cases, eliminated. Sightsavers is recognised internationally for its high-impact work and has a proven capacity to manage and deliver outcomes on large scale health programmes in sub-Saharan Africa.

We work with thousands of local volunteers and have distributed more than a billion donated treatments to protect people against NTDs. We have helped to eliminate trachoma as a public health problem in several countries, including The Gambia, Ghana, Malawi, Benin, and Mali. We have also delivered two million training courses to health workers and volunteer community drug distributors. Yet despite our progress so far, there is more to be done.

# Frontline stories: Meet ophthalmic nurse Jeremiah

Jeremiah (pictured) has been working as an ophthalmic nurse in Zimbabwe since receiving training from Sightsavers more than 20 years ago. After his grandmother went blind, he was determined to stop the same happening to other people.

In Binga, where Jeremiah works, trachoma is common in childhood, sometimes affecting children as young as three years old. Scarring from trachoma, caused when the eyelashes turn inwards and scrape



against the eyeball, is often found in children over the age of 14. The advanced form of the disease, known as trichiasis, is common in patients over the age of 30, which concerns Jeremiah.

If left untreated, trichiasis can lead to blindness. But ophthalmic nurses like Jeremiah can help treat and prevent the disease by referring patients for surgery and distributing medication that protects communities.

As well as successes, there are many daily challenges in Jeremiah's work. A lack of funding and resources means a shortage of basic drugs, limited equipment for operations and not enough transportation to reach rural communities. In the future, he hopes to see basic health care available for everyone, more awareness programmes to help prevent people from going blind and additional funding partnerships that focus on eliminating trachoma.
